The Forty Plus Cycling Club
Year 1964

The meeting commenced at $3.40 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. with 37 members present.
The Chairman, Mr. Irving, welcomed members and expressed pleasure at seeing so many on a "not very good day".

Apologies for absence were received from Messes. Canham, Groom and Neville.

1. Confirmation of Minutes of Twelfth A.G.M.

The Minutes had been circulated to ail members of the Club.
It was moved by Mr. Hankin and seconded by Mr. Thurston that the Minutes as circulated be accepted. There being no questions as to their accuracy, these were accordingly signed by the Chairman as a correct record.
2. Matters Arising from the Minutes Not Included in the Agenda for the Present Meeting.

In reply to a query re room hire, the Chairman informed the meeting that the Club had been paying 10/- for the use of a room for committee meetings but that this had recently been raised to $£ 1$. Inquiries were, however, being made with a view to obtaining alternative premises at the same price as before.

## 3. Secretary's Report.

This had been circulated to all members of the Club.
It was moved by Mr. Wooder and seconded by Mr. Jeffreys that the Secretary's.report. be accepted with appreciation.

The Secretary, Mr. Seymour; enlarged on the report by saying that he was very pleased at the increase in membership at a time when cycling appeared to be on the decline and added that, as a result, we could now look to the future with confidence.: Referring to our inability to find a Social Secretary, he said that we should endeavour to fill this office, not only for the purpose of arranging the Annual Dinner, but in order that other social functions might be organized throughout the year also. The publication of the new Handbook, he explained, had been delayed for this year only, in order that the proposed alterations to the Rules (see 5(a) of the present agenda) might te incorporated.

Mr. Downey remarked that the attendance at the Dinner was very good and asked if the membership was still increasing, to which the Secretary replied that 9 new members had already joined this year but informed the enquirer that the attendance at the Dinner did not consist exclusively of Club members.

Mr. Tackley, referring to the comment in the report on the scarcity of catering establishments, asked that members finding new ones should notify him in order that he might publish them in "Signpost".

The Secretary's report was then adopted.
4. Audited Accounts.

It was moved by Mr. Jeffreys and seconded by Mr. Wooder that the Income and Expenditure Account and Balance Sheet as circulated be adopted.

The Auditor, Mr. Fitzpatrick, commented that the accounts were in a healthy state cut warned that, with rising costs, we should not be too complacent. His job, he added, had been an easy one owing to the efficient way in which they had been kept by the Secretary.

Mr. Knapp remarked that expenditure had been kept down largely owing to the low cost of the printing of the Magazine and Mr. Wooder added that Mr. Pemberton had helped considerably by supplying paper at a very low price.
5. To Give Consideration to the Following Proposals from the Committee. -
(a) "That an office of Treasurer be created, that Mr. George Knapp be appointed to that office and that the Committee be empowered to make the necessary alterations to the rules."


The Chairman explained that, at the last A.G.M., the Secretary had expressed a desire to be relieved of the Treasureris part of his duties, mainly owing to the fact that he disliked having to worry members for money, and that Mr. Knapp had subsequently been co-opted and was willing to continue as Treasurer. He asked for comments and, in response to a question, said that subscriptions should now be sent to the Treasurer, witbout first going through the Secretary.

The proposal was carried unanimously.
(b) "That power be granted to investigate the possibilities of a life membership scheme and to institute such a scheme if found feasible."

The Secretary explained that if we had such a scheme it would, of course, be obligatory to individual members. Its advantages consisted in assisting the collection of subscriptions and helping an ageing membership to continue as members at a time when it might become more difficult owing to retirement. Expert advice could be obtained on the preblem of investment and on the rate to charge for such a scheme.

Mr. Fitzpatrick asked if there might not be a legal difficulty, in that the club might be cound to give something to each life member throughout his life and what would ke the position if the Club ceased to exist. The Secretary did not know but promised to enquire.

In reply to further questions, the Secretary said that we should probably go to an: Actuary for advice on what to charge and that a sounding of members could be made to find out how many were likely to be interested, although he pointed out that it was not only present members who had to be considered but also those we hoped to gain in the future.

Mr. Fitzpatrick then moved the following amendment, which was seconded ky Mr. Downey, $\rightarrow$

> "That power be granted to the committee to investigate the possibilities of a life membership scheme and to report back to the next A.G.M. with concrete proposals for such a scheme if one should te found feasible and desirable."

Mr. Covington said that he had had experience of such schemes and that these did not include magazines and literature, which had to be paid for separately, and he thought this undesirable.

Mr. Downey suggested imposing a condition on life memkers that they contact the club at least once a year, e.g. on a run or at a meeting or social function, or perhaps that they should'be ordinary members for 10 years before being allowed to become life members or, again, that they became life members 5 years before retiring. He would like the Committee to consider these suggestions.

The Secretary said that the idea was that life members should enjoy all the ibenefits of the ordinary member.

Mr. Parker thought it usual to put all the life subscriptions into a special account and not to use them as the normal income was used. Therefore, if $\frac{3}{4}$ of the membership took out life membership, our income would diminish too much.

The Chairman assured the meeting that all these things would he investigated by the Committee, who were simply asking for permission to go into the question furthors: and it might be found that the scheme would not work in a club of this kind,

Mr. Covington said that it could be stipulated that the life membership fee would not ke returnable.

In reply to a question from Mr. Clark as to whether it $\infty$ uld be done on an honorary casis for meritorious or long service, the Chairman replied that we had a precedent here, as a result of which this method was not considered satisfactory by this Club.

The Secretary here intervened to say that a life member would definitely be an asset to the Club, as westage would be reduced, and that the only question to be considered was whether we should lose money :over it. Mr. Fitzpatrick, while agreeing with this, added that the legal aspect would have to ke looked into.

The motion as amended was carried.

The Chairman announced that the Chairman, Secretary, Editor and Auditor were willing to stand again and reminded the meeting that the Treasurer, Mr. Knapp, had already been appointed and that Mrs. Lang retained the title of President. The following officers were then elected:-

The Chairman pointed out that this question had been considered before and that, as a result, slower rides were now being arranged, while another member remarked that some of the older members were faster than some of the younger ones.

There being no further subjects for discussion, Mr. Wonder proposed a vote of thanks to Mrs. Seymour and complimented those who had come on long journeys - even from as far as Aylesbury, Basildon and Southend - to attend the meeting, which closed at $5.50 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}_{\mathrm{o}}$.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR 1963.

It seems a little difficult to realise that I am now writing my fifth report on the activities of the Forty Plus C.C. or that I have had the honour of serving you for this period. It is, however, reassuring to read notices recording that periods of 30 years or more are by no means unusual in club secretarial duties, a fact of which the moral is by no means obscure.

The pattern of events in our club.is now stabilized; but this does not imply that variations on the theme are either nonexistent or not under constant consideration. The Sunday outings and the occasional weekends, together with the Bank Holiday arrangements, all due to the able, hard working leaders, show quite a considerable variety, even if this is to-day somewhat restricted by the increasing scarcity of catering establishments.

The Journal named "Signpost" has, I believe you will admit, fulfilled its name and quarterly has recounted the travels of the members, together with articles of general interest and news of events. Under Stuart Tackley it, also, has attained stability and will now continue a very useful function down the coming years.

The Dinner, held again in 1963 at the "Talbot", attracted a record attendance of 94 diners, and by general consent was voted a considerable success. This was made possible under a suk-committee of Don Irving, George Canham and Tom Wooder, set up to promote the function, a somewhat sobering comment on this being that no Social Secretary was found during the year, and I sincerely hope that in 1964 this unfortunate position will be rectified.

On the statistical side, I am very pleased to report that membership stands at 120, an all-time record and an increase of 17 on 1962. This reflects considerable credit on all those responsible and, although such growth can hardly be deemed normal, it certainly has improved the Club's future. The increase can be seen reflected in the accounts, which show a comfortable surplus, and this permits your Committee to examine improvements in administration with some confidence.

To mention the Chairman and the Auditor is to draw attention to two more officials without whose efficient, unobtrusive work your Club would not run successfully.

In conclusion, I would wish to repeat my previous hope that all of you have a very enjoyable year on your travels and that all of you who can possibly do so attend the Annual General Meeting. This year the pill will be sugared by being followed by a slide show, an innovation which your Committee hope will produce a satisfactory gathering.

## Minutes of Iest Meeting.

These were accepted as a correct record on a motion by Mr. Knapp seconded by Mr. Drewett, with the exception of the name of new member Clark to be substituted for that of Hart in the runs leader report by Mr. Warburst. With the alteration accepted and made by the Chairman, he accordingly afgeed the Minutes as a true record.

## Matters Arisinge.

Mr. Drewett asked whether Mr. Groom had been contacted regarding Arthuar Ifne and his band. Mr. Irving said this had been done and also that Mr. Ifonel Blundell and Mr. Hex Coley had been asked to attend and to propose and reply to toasts if willing. Mr. Jim Ford would be prepared to toast the visitors. Mr. Reg Shew had also been contacted. Mr. Irving said that, although the Club was still without a Social Secretary, this might be rectified at the A.G.M. Meanwhile, he was prepared to carry on à In 1963 and Mr. Wooder also again offered his assistance.

## Secretary is Report and Correspondence.

The Secretary read : the correspondence he had received since the last meeting relating to renewals of membership and enquiries relating to the Club. The financial picture for 1964 was, of course, not yet of interest. To date 7 new members had been added to membership. Mr. Knapp also read correspondence received from members remitting subscriptions and from a possible new member in Leicester, also a communication from Mr. Reg Shaw. The number of subscriptions paid to date was 68 but this was open to daily revision.

## Annual General Meeting.

Regarding the agenda, a proposition was to be put forward for the creation of a position of Club Treasurer and the committee to be empowered to make the necessary alterations to the rules - a copy of the alterations proposed to be available for examination. Also a proposition for permission to inarganate a life membership scheme if found practicable. In view of the

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alterations to rules and Club Officers, Mr. Canham proposed and Mr. Wooder seconded that the publication of the Handbook be delayed for 1964 until after the A.G.M. and this was agreed. Mr. Irving said consideration would have to be given to the position of Mr. Fyfe, who had not attended any committee meetings during the year. He as ggested that the members present at the A.G.M. be advised against the possible proposition of suggesting an on bloc re-election of committee. Mr. Seymour said that, in cormentatig on the accounts, which he hoped had been examined, the balance sheet commencing figure for 1962 would include the Gestetner, thus showing £112.12.11, which was originally intended, and brought the presentation into line with that suggested by Mr. Canham. The Committee gave favourable consideration to a suggestion that, for future years, the presentation of a balance sheet be discontinued and a straight income and expenditure accuunt be prepared with an addendum of any club assets shown at current valuation.

The meeting then adjourned and was resumed at the nCrown and Sugarloafn, Garlick Hill, E.G.4, on Thursday, February 6th.

Mr. Tackley read a letter he had composed suggesting that fixtures to the south of London be discontinued gat least temporarily, and apologized that he himself was not placed in a position to be able to assist in activities in the area regularly. He suggested that support would have to come materially from the other areas. It was disclosed that the original

Mr. Wooder and Mr. Tackley promised to assist as far as practicable.

## Runs Leaders' and Editor's Reports,

Mr. Warhurst reported that the November run had appeared in "Signpost". In December, to wooburn Moor, there had been 7 to elevenses, 7 to lunch and the run had been home to tea. In January, 11 to elevenses at Rickmansworth, 11 to lunch at Cholesbury and again home to tea.

Len Hathaway had made a welcome appearance on the run after the loss of his wife. The cafe at Abbots Langley was now closed on Sunday; the necessary change was being conveyed to as many members as possible.

Mr. Drewett said that the December 15th fixture was the Christmas Dinner, which was organised by Mr. Wooder. On January 12th, on an informal run, 7 met at North Weald, with 4 to lunch at Sawbridgeworth and then home to tea. He had attended the Southern run on January fth and was the only one at elevenses at Longfield but had met Hugh Jones and Rita Woolf at lunch.

Mr. oder reported 15 to elevenses on December list with 12 to lunch and 9 to tea. The Christmas Dinner had attracted an attendance of 32. The meeting closed at 8.25 with a vote of thanks to the Acting Chairman proposed by Mr. Knapp and seconded by Mr. Wooder.

The Secretary's report was accepted on a motion by Mr. Warburst. seconded by Mr. Drewett.

Treasurer is Report.
Mr. Knapp reported one renewal, Mr. Parsons of the U.S.A., since the last meeting, and read a letter received from him. Wi th four additional members, this brought the paid-up membership for the year to date to 129, an Increase of 9.
