On the receipts side, the item of interest received includes an extra $\ddagger 15$ following repayment of 60 that had been in the care of trusteed for the last five yearso
On tho payments side, the 1970 item of 864.00 for paper and duplicating supplies, included a laree purchase of paper we were able to obtain at a low price, so that none further need be purchased for a while. In adeition, a big saving has been made by iscuing the handbook in duplicated form instead of having it printed, and the postage has been kept down by a cood proportion of $3 . Y . I$. (Deliver it yourself)。, We are deeply indebted to our woa, Sec, fora all the extra work he has undertaken in these respects. Our paid membership for the year was zo1, the same figure as for 1970, since the end of the year two more 1971 subs have been paid in arreas, making, the total 203. By the end of January we had already enrolled 8 :new. menbers for 1972.
My thanks are due to our President, Ion, Sec; and the Wuas Leaciers, for their assistance in collecting subscriptions, and to all the members who regularly send on their dues without waiting for written requests. This co-operätion mekes. it. possible for me to continue as your treasurer should you wish to re-elect me at the A.G.M, despite my moving to an area away from the Club's activitís.
