SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30th SEPTENBER 1983.
Because of Mrs.Gardher's difficulty in speaking Mr.Moore the President read out the report for her. Mr. Turner then spoke about the report thanking Mrs.Gardner for her work in such difficult times for her.

The Eastern \& Northern Thursdays "A" \& "B" and: Sundays: have I feel maintained a good average number of riders, also the Southend Section: Hayden Rumball's Section, Luton Group, led by Ron Drew and the Southern Rides on Wednesdays \& Sundays have all been a bit. dis appointing as to numbers turning up for rides, but we are hoping that in the near future we shall have a small section going in the East Kent area. The turnout at the Black Horse at Paslow Common on Tuesdays has been very well attended with anything up to 45 members arriving for lunch: Down in the deep South, Bob Edgar and Fred Aldis have kept the rides going well, our $8 i$ year old leader Bob is to be congratulated on his efforts to keep the flag flying.

Bank Holiday Tours seem to be disappearing now and only Easter was attended when we went up to East Anglia, we had no support or offers of leaders for any of the other holidays.

Membership had been maintained and at the close of the Club's year we had 462 mèrbers, that is 45 up on the same date in 1982. Some 37 members did not renew for 1983 but as new members are always being taken it does not affect our total at all. We still have two Founder Members in Ted \& Doris Groom, and a few more who joined in the early 1950s. We have 2 Members in Canada, 2 in the U. S.A. 1 in New Zealand and Cyril Henry in Northern Ireland. We now have 20 who are 80 years old or over and I eagerly await the fist Lady to reach this Grand Age. I do hope that you will continue to inform me of members who, being rather a modest lot, are somewhat reluctant tio. tell me when they are approaching their 80th birthdays.

During the year we, have said our last farewells to Frank Humphrey, Frank Trueman (Our Chairman) Faith Reason, Frank Good, Lew pemberton, Arthur Kilby (The printer of our magazine covers and Headed Paper) and Stan Bellchamber. Some members who do not renew feel must have passed away but I do not always hear of them"

## JACR AVORTY

As briefly reported in the May/June 'Newsletter', Jack Ivory has died. To most of the present day members of the Lea Valley Road Cwe his name was just another. OLD TIMER'S WHICH ISN'T SURPRISING FOR WE HAON'T SEEN MUCH OF HIM IN the Club for some years. But, to those former memeers of the Comet C.C. who knew Jack in his heyohy from 1938 vHEN HE JOINED TO THE TIME WHEN the lea valley mas forveq, he was a LIKEABLE, FORGEFUL AND LOYAL FRIEND and clubahte in every sense of the HORD.

In his time he was a prominent and SUCCESSFUL TIME-TRIALLIST, ESPECIALLY at the longer distances. Perhaps his best ever ride was in the ecca 12hours mainly on E. 1 course in 1950, when, with 253-3/8 miles, he ran second to Vic Gibeons of the Brentwood road Cwb, theraby breaking THE COMET'S CLBB. ReCORD - AND THAT'S not been beaten in. the Comet or the Lea Valley up to this day.
Another fine ride of Jack's was in the highate 100 in 1951 which he won WITH 4-23-53 ON THE NORTH ROADcounse. I remenber. AlSO, A war-time 'I2' PUT ON BY THE NORTH ROAD C.C. IN PLACE OF THEIR '24" IN, I THINK, 1940 of 41, When, with no fantr than nime runctures, he COVERED 234 miles, running second to Ron Kitching by ONLY A MILE OR TYO.
in Comet Cub events he was a prolific winner, being CLue Champion FOUR TIMES.


On top of this very busy time-trials programme Jack mas also a keen and efficient omb official and supporter of Clue rins and social activities. He organised the cilassic Comet Open ${ }^{\circ} 25^{\circ}$ very SUCCESSFULLY ON SEVERAL OCCASIONS IN THE 1960'S.

For his services to the Clus he was electad both as a life Memger and as Vice- President, being the only peeson ever to holo the two honours at the same time.
he also found time to caray out a iot of long distance tours and meer-ends. ly wasn ali this that endearg hila to us. He was usually a happy, exhuberant bloke, prone to hearty laugerter - and this was loudest when someone else was in'trouble' though, Let it be said, he was aluays the first to get his hands dirty if it mas machine trovble. I can remenber the look on one nen member's face when Jack proceeded to strip out a faulty headset on Clapham Conmon - but he fixed it for the lad. That lad, charlie galbraith, is still riding regularly today. For myself, I had plenty of these long aides with old jack and almays found him an ideal companion.

And now we've saio our last farewells to a fine Clubmate. he died in the Royal National Homopathic hospital where he'd been a patient on and off for over two years during the night of $16 / 17$ th. June. Peacerully in his slegp.

The Certificate gave cause of death as Cancer of the Throat but I feel sure there must have been a lot more wrong. He suffered a good deal of paln internally at times and had phactically lost the use of his legs. The ooctors worked hard on him and at times it seemed they were winning and usually, When his friends visited hin, he seemed cheerful ard talked about riding his bike again. All the same I have the privilege of reading a letter Jack sent to his brother, Syo, with a list of friendos to be contacted and things to be done mhen the time came. This was dated February 1982, soon after HE FIRST WENT INTO HOSPITAL, SO IT LEAVES ME MONDERING WHETHER HE PUT ON HIS BRIGHT AND OPTIMISTIC face when friends want in to see him just to cheer ihgm up, knowing all the.time that the dice were LOADED AGAINST him. I WOULDN'T fUT it past the cantankerous cuss.

BUT, ON MY LAST VISIT, only a day or two before his death, there yas no bright face. Jack looked VERY ROUGH INDEED AND ACTUALLY SAID HE HOPED IT WOULD SOON BE OVER. If HE PRAYEU FOR THIS HIS PRAYER WAS QUICKLY ANSWERED AND HE WAS RELEASED FROM HIS PAIN A DAY OR TWO LATER. I LEFT THAT EVENING knowing - yes, knowing - that l'o never see my old mate again.

The cremation was at St. Pancras $\%$ Islington Cemetery, Finchley, on 28 tho June. Apart from relatives and fellow-members of the forty-plus C.C. (with whioh Club Jack had begn riding for many years) there was a strong contingent from the lea Valley, incuoing several old Comet members, together vith cycling fri gids from the Rosslyn Ladies C.C., Essex Roads, Upton Manor and other clubs. I understand there were several of jack's cab-oriver friends present also.

As for me, my thoughts inere not on the formalitigs nor on imat the minister was saying. No. Ny heart was back with Jack to waretime days of. 1939 45 when we rode the near deserted roads of Englanc together. So long ago........................
