Election of Chairman

The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held in February 1983 <sup>were</sup> accepted as read, they having been printed in the last (December) issue of the Club Magazine "Signpost".

MATTERS ARISING. Mr. Finnimore brought up the subject of either a Saturday or Sunday mentioned at the end of the minutes, saying that it did appear that we decided to have the A.G.M. & Luncheon on a Sunday, Mrs. Gardner said that it had been brought up at the first Committee meeting following the last A.G.M. when it was decided to leave it to her to try and fix a date with the Union Jack Club and that as it turned out she was only able to book a Saturday, as no Sunday dates were available at the time we wanted it.

The Minutes were then accepted by all those members present.

SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30th SEPTEMBER 1983.

Because of Mrs. Gardner's difficulty in speaking Mr. Moore the President read out the report for her. Mr. Turner then spoke about the report thanking Mrs. Gardner for her work in such difficult times for her.

The Meeting began with the election of a Chairman, it being necessary because our elected Chairman had died since the last A.G.M. and Mr. Bill Turner (Corfield St) was elected and took the chair immediately.

Mr. Bill Hill brought up the matter of the Re-Union which he and Mr. Moore had been trying to arrange. Mr. Hill had tried at the Wellington at Barwick and Mr. Moore had tried at The Rest & Welcome at Haultwick, but both places were unable to do anything at the week-ends, but had suggested that it would be easier in mid-week when they were not so busy. Mrs. Gardner said that she thought that there was no reason why we could not have it in the week, and Mr. Moore agreed with this suggestion and it was thought that a Thursday would be the most suitable day. Mr. Newman then said that a weekday would of course be difficult for those members who were still working, but it was pointed out that this would always be a difficulty trying to suit everyone at all times. Mr. Turner (Chairman) mentioned that after all most of our members were retired, and Mrs. Gardner mentioned the number we had who attended the Eastern Christmas Dinner at Treetops Epping during the week, at well over 100.

Mrs. Gardner then asked Mr. Moore and Mr. Hill to try and arrange a week-day get-together during lunchtime at either Haultwick or Barwick and she would see that it was mentioned in Signpost.

Mr. Collins then mentioned the annual tea party that they held at his home at the end of July and said that anyone who cared to come along would be welcome. Mrs. Gardner said she would also put that welcome in Signpost.

FINANCIAL REPORT.

A copy of the final accounts having also been printed in the December issue of Signpost, there was no need to read out the report. Mr. Turner asked if anyone had any queries regarding the accounts but none were forthcoming and Mr. Finnimore then proposed that the accounts be accepted and Mr. Taylor (Ramsgate) seconded and this was agreed by all.

Mr. Collins ask how the sale of the new Cloth Badges was going and Mrs. Gardner said they were selling very well, even better than she had expected, and that she now had a new supply of the Metal Badges and that like everything else the price had to be increased and they would now be at 60p each but no one seemed to mind that at all.

THE MOTION BY MR. WOODER Regarding the possibility of raising the Club Subscriptions to allow us to build up reserves for possibilities of extra charges was discussed in full. Mr. Jefford said that he would not recommend it at all. Mr. Turner (Chairman) said that we had discussed it at the last Committee meeting but that as Mr. Wooder was very keen on having it put forward as a MOTION at the A.G.M. it was agreed to allow it to stand. The Committee had agreed that as a Club we were very fortunate in that we had some very willing workers who did so much for the Club in their spare time and all for no charge. Mrs. Bazely said that at some other Clubs the Subs: were far more than ours and that so many of them also had to pay extra for their magazines. Mr. Collins asked what items any increases would be expected to cover and Mrs. Gardner said it would be the possibility of a new duplicator, or if that were not possible then we would perhaps have to pay to have our magazine printed and that would be very expensive. Mr. Finnimore said that he felt these items would not be necessary since we could not foresee the future, we did have our band of volunteers, and if we compared ~~our~~ these people with the way the C.T.C. had to pay for everything they had done he felt that it would not be necessary, and that he thought that Mr. Wooder was crying before he was hurt, but it was pointed out that Mr. Wooder was really only trying to be realistic and thinking of the clubs' welfare.

Mr. Taylor (Ramsgate) said that <sup>he</sup> ~~we~~ was sure that if Subs: were increased there would be plenty of members who would not renew, and that would be particularly some of the new members that he had been getting in his area in East Kent, and that it would be better to keep the Subs: at the present level and also keep our membership at the same numbers as at present.

Mr. Hill said that the Subs: at £1. per year were after all only the price of 1½ pints of beer and that we should really try to get this thing in proportion. Mr. Newman said that he was against any increase, he felt that as a Club we were rather unique in our methods and service, he also felt that the £1. Subs: were the best value in the country and that he was sure that we would be OK and that we ought to leave the Subs: as they were, after all the Magazine only cost about 10p each copy and plus postage for those that were not hand delivered. The Chairman then asked for a seconder and Mr. Vesper replied. After a vote of 6 for the Motion and everyone else against, it was lost.

Mr. Collins then suggested that if we ever do find ourselves in any difficulties over finances then we could convene a special General Meeting to decide what we should do to cover this and all agreed.

Mr. Kersey again remarked that our Club must be the cheapest in the country. Mrs. Bazeley mentioned postage as being 17p to 22p. John Wright queried the cost of Signpost and the cost of a new duplicator. Mrs. Ford said that in the light of us having about 460 members surely we could find other members to take on jobs if it ever became necessary.

THE MOTION BY MR. BILL TURNER (Chairman) That the club consider the purchase of obtaining transfers as we used to have some years ago. He felt that it was a good advert for the club to see them on our bicycles. Mr. Vesper seconded the motion, Mr. Shelton asked what form of transfer they were, either paper or the metallic type. The answer was 'Paper'. After some discussion it was agreed to leave the Secretary to get in touch with some manufacturers to see what the price would be and purchase them if the committee agreed.

THE MOTION BY MR. BILL HILL. That the A.G.M. be still held in London but in future we have a Luncheon on a different day and at a different venue. Mr. Maxwell was in favour of this separation. Mrs. Ford also agreed that we have the AGM at the Union Jack Club and that the Secretary find out if we could just hire a room for that purpose without having a luncheon the same day. Several members spoke about the difficulty of finding a suitable venue in London, and that the cost in London would always be rather more expensive than at a venue outside London. One member asked if exactly ~~where~~ we could define where London ended and outside began. It was generally agreed that central London was accessible to all as our members lived around London. Mr. Reason said that he rather liked the two functions on the one day at the one place and did not feel that the cost of travel to London should be considered everything, many members had Bus permits and others held rail cards. Mrs. Bazeley remarked that in her opinion it was the folk who did all the moaning who do not generally attend the meetings and functions.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS.

Mr. Moore again brought up the question of holding a Luncheon and suggested that it could be on a section basis, each section having their celebration and inviting any members who would be able to attend from outside their areas and Mr. Jefford seconded this idea. It was then put to a vote and carried unanimously.

Mrs. Gardner then said that the Auditor had suggested that we should not accept subscriptions in advance of more than five years, he felt that it would not be advantageous to us if our subs: had to be increased, Mr. Finnimore was in favour of accepting all that was offered and while could get it. Another member, Mr. Cheesman said that actually it was not within the Auditor's powers to suggest these things, he should be quite apart from Club rules in that sense. After some discussion it was agreed by all present to leave the five years commuted Subs: as it was, stick to the rules and accept anyone who wished to pay further in advance.

The meeting closed at 12.30pm with a vote of thanks to the Chairman, he had done well on his very first effort.

SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30th SEPTEMBER 1983

Upon looking at the Final Accounts in the December issue of Signpost I think you will agree that financially we are still in a very healthy position and managing to keep our heads above water.

Looking back on the runs that have been programmed during the year I feel that it has also been a very worthwhile time for us all. The St. Albans, Stevenage & North Herts: and also the new East Herts: Sections have all been going well with good numbers out on runs. The Eastern & Northern Thursdays "A" & "B" and Sundays have I feel maintained a good average number of riders, also the Southend Section: Hayden Rumball's Section, Luton Group, led by Ron Drew and the Southern Rides on Wednesdays & Sundays have all been a bit disappointing as to numbers turning up for rides, but we are hoping that in the near future we shall have a small section going in the East Kent area. The turnout at the Black Horse at Paslow Common on Tuesdays has been very well attended with anything up to 45 members arriving for lunch. Down in the deep South, Bob Edgar and Fred Aldis have kept the rides going well, our 81 year old leader Bob is to be congratulated on his efforts to keep the flag flying.

Bank Holiday Tours seem to be disappearing now and only Easter was attended when we went up to East Anglia, we had no support or offers of leaders for any of the other holidays.

Membership has been maintained and at the close of the Club's year we had 462 members, that is 45 up on the same date in 1982. Some 37 members did not renew for 1983 but as new members are always being taken it does not affect our total at all. We still have two Founder Members in Ted & Doris Groom, and a few more who joined in the early 1950s. We have 2 Members in Canada, 2 in the U.S.A. 1 in New Zealand and Cyril Henry in Northern Ireland. We now have 20 who are 80 years old or over and I eagerly await the first Lady to reach this Grand Age. I do hope that you will continue to inform me of members who, being rather a modest lot, are somewhat reluctant to tell me when they are approaching their 80th birthdays.

During the year we have said our last farewells to Frank Humphrey, Frank Trueman (Our Chairman) Faith Reason, Frank Good, Lew Pemberton, Arthur Kilby (The printer of our magazine covers and Headed Paper) and Stan Bellchamber. Minutes of the Committee Meeting held at the Castle Public House on Saturday 7th January 1984.

Mr. Engel was quite obviously upset about it all and in his letter he officially resigned. The matter was discussed at length by Messrs. Turner, Wooder, Moore, Fielden, Collins and Newman. Mrs.Gardner said that she had contacted everyone else concerned in the hand delivery of the magazine and had received a very good response and that all of the 'Hand Deliveries' were again covered. She also mentioned that Mr.Newman and Mr.Taylor (Ramsgate) had made certain enquiries regarding the costs of posting some magazines off in bulk for other members to hand deliver. 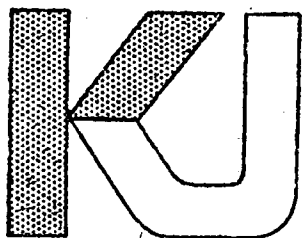

The Treasurer's Financial Report was discussed and it was agreed that the report be accepted. Proposed by Mr. Germain. 2nd. Mr. Wooder.

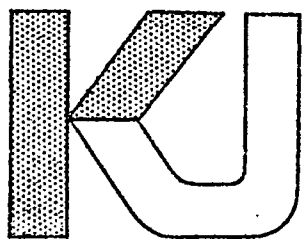

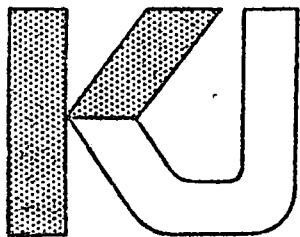

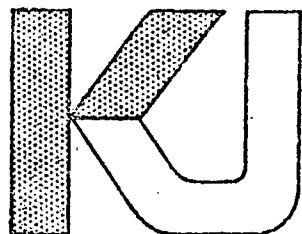

Appologies for absence were received from Mr.W.Collins and Mrs.D. Bazely. It was noticed that Mr.Wooder was not present but no one seemed to know why.

The Minutes of the meeting held on 7th January 1984 were read by the Chairman Mr.W.Turner. and were accepted as a true record. Prop. by Mr.Wyatt and 2nd. by Mr.W.Hill.

MINUTES OF THE COMMITTEE MEETING HELD AT THE CASTLE PUBLIC HOUSE  
ON SATURDAY 7th JULY 1984.

3/84

The Meeting commenced at 12.15 pm with appologies for absence from Mr. Collins. Mr. Hill & Mr. Wooder.

The Minutes of the meeting held on 7th April 1984 were read by Mr. W. Turner. (Chairman) agreed as a correct record. Prop. Mr. Moore. 2nd. Mr. Wyatt.

MATTERS ARISING. Mr. Finnimore mentioned Mr. Vesper's runs which he said were actually the same distances in the long summer days as in the short days of winter and he thought that they could be extended, but Mr. Vesper said that he had said earlier that if members did not like that arrangement then they should also speak to those other members who attended his runs, and that if they felt that longer runs were liked then they could always join up with Mr. Scrutton's runs which were always of longer distances.

Mrs. Ford then mentioned the business of the new club transfer and said that she had made enquiries of Mr. Brunwin who had the matter in hand and he had said that the people who he had hoped would do it felt that it was not a commercial proposition and that the order had now been sent to someone in Austria! there was general laughter over this, but all agreed to wait and see what came of it, it seemed the only thing to do in the circumstances.

Mr. W. IN HIS TIME HE WAS A PROMINENT AND SUCCESSFUL TIME-TRIALLIST, ESPECIALLY AT THE LONGER DISTANCES. PERHAPS HIS BEST EVER RIDE WAS IN THE ECCA 12 - HOURS MAINLY ON E.1 COURSE IN 1950, WHEN, WITH 253-3/8 MILES, HE RAN SECOND TO VIC GIBBONS OF THE BRENTWOOD ROAD CLUB, THEREBY BREAKING THE COMET'S CLUB RECORD - AND THAT'S NOT BEEN BEATEN IN THE COMET OR THE LEA VALLEY UP TO THIS DAY.

ANOTHER FINE RIDE OF JACK'S WAS IN THE HIGHGATE 100 IN 1951 WHICH HE WON WITH 4 - 23 - 53 ON THE NORTH ROAD COURSE. I REMEMBER, ALSO, A WAR-TIME '12' PUT ON BY THE NORTH ROAD C.C. IN PLACE OF THEIR '24' IN, I THINK, 1940 OR 41, WHEN, WITH NO FEWER THAN NINE PUNCTURES, HE COVERED 234 MILES, RUNNING SECOND TO RON KITCHING BY ONLY A MILE OR TWO.

IN COMET CLUB EVENTS HE WAS A PROLIFIC WINNER, BEING CLUB CHAMPION FOUR TIMES.

ON TOP OF THIS VERY BUSY TIME-TRIALS PROGRAMME JACK WAS ALSO A KEEN AND EFFICIENT CLUB OFFICIAL AND SUPPORTER OF CLUB RUNS AND SOCIAL ACTIVITIES. HE ORGANISED THE CLASSIC COMET OPEN '25' VERY SUCCESSFULLY ON SEVERAL OCCASIONS IN THE 1960'S.

FOR HIS SERVICES TO THE CLUB HE WAS ELECTED BOTH AS A LIFE MEMBER AND AS VICE-PRESIDENT, BEING THE ONLY PERSON EVER TO HOLD THE TWO HONOURS AT THE SAME TIME.

HE ALSO FOUND TIME TO CARRY OUT A LOT OF LONG DISTANCE TOURS AND WEEK-ENDS. IT WASN'T ALL THIS THAT ENDEARED HIM TO US. HE WAS USUALLY A HAPPY, EXHUBERANT BLOKE, PRONE TO HEARTY LAUGHTER - AND THIS WAS LOUDEST WHEN SOMEONE ELSE WAS IN 'TROUBLE' THOUGH, LET IT BE SAID, HE WAS ALWAYS THE FIRST TO GET HIS HANDS DIRTY IF IT WAS MACHINE TROUBLE. I CAN REMEMBER THE LOOK ON ONE NEW MEMBER'S FACE WHEN JACK PROCEEDED TO STRIP OUT A FAULTY HEADSET ON CLAPHAM COMMON - BUT HE FIXED IT FOR THE LAD. THAT LAD, CHARLIE GALBRAITH, IS STILL RIDING REGULARLY TODAY. FOR MYSELF, I HAD PLENTY OF THESE LONG RIDES WITH OLD JACK AND ALWAYS FOUND HIM AN IDEAL COMPANION.

AND NOW WE'VE SAID OUR LAST FAREWELLS TO A FINE CLUBMATE. HE DIED IN THE ROYAL NATIONAL HOMOPATHIC HOSPITAL WHERE HE'D BEEN A PATIENT ON AND OFF FOR OVER TWO YEARS DURING THE NIGHT OF 16/17TH. JUNE. PEACEFULLY IN HIS SLEEP.

THE CERTIFICATE GAVE CAUSE OF DEATH AS CANCER OF THE THROAT BUT I FEEL SURE THERE MUST HAVE BEEN A LOT MORE WRONG. HE SUFFERED A GOOD DEAL OF PAIN INTERNALLY AT TIMES AND HAD PRACTICALLY LOST THE USE OF HIS LEGS. THE DOCTORS WORKED HARD ON HIM AND AT TIMES IT SEEMED THEY WERE WINNING AND USUALLY, WHEN HIS FRIENDS VISITED HIM, HE SEEMED CHEERFUL AND TALKED ABOUT RIDING HIS BIKE AGAIN. ALL THE SAME I HAVE THE PRIVILEGE OF READING A LETTER JACK SENT TO HIS BROTHER, SYD, WITH A LIST OF FRIENDS TO BE CONTACTED AND THINGS TO BE DONE WHEN THE TIME CAME. THIS WAS DATED FEBRUARY 1982, SOON AFTER HE FIRST WENT INTO HOSPITAL, SO IT LEAVES ME WONDERING WHETHER HE PUT ON HIS BRIGHT AND OPTIMISTIC FACE WHEN FRIENDS WENT IN TO SEE HIM JUST TO CHEER THEM UP, KNOWING ALL THE TIME THAT THE DICE WERE LOADED AGAINST HIM. I WOULDN'T PUT IT PAST THE CANTANKEROUS CUSS.

BUT, ON MY LAST VISIT, ONLY A DAY OR TWO BEFORE HIS DEATH, THERE WAS NO BRIGHT FACE. JACK LOOKED VERY ROUGH INDEED AND ACTUALLY SAID HE HOPED IT WOULD SOON BE OVER. IF HE PRAYED FOR THIS HIS PRAYER WAS QUICKLY ANSWERED AND HE WAS RELEASED FROM HIS PAIN A DAY OR TWO LATER. I LEFT THAT EVENING KNOWING - YES, KNOWING - THAT I'D NEVER SEE MY OLD MATE AGAIN.

THE CREMATION WAS AT ST. PANCRAS / ISLINGTON CEMETERY, FINCHLEY, ON 28TH. JUNE. APART FROM RELATIVES AND FELLOW-MEMBERS OF THE FORTY-PLUS C.C. ( WITH WHICH CLUB JACK HAD BEEN RIDING FOR MANY YEARS ) THERE WAS A STRONG CONTINGENT FROM THE LEA VALLEY, INCLUDING SEVERAL OLD COMET MEMBERS, TOGETHER WITH CYCLING FRIENDS FROM THE ROSSLYN LADIES C.C., ESSEX ROADS, UPTON MANOR AND OTHER CLUBS. I UNDERSTAND THERE WERE SEVERAL OF JACK'S CAB-DRIVER FRIENDS PRESENT ALSO.

AS FOR ME, MY THOUGHTS WERE NOT ON THE FORMALITIES NOR ON WHAT THE MINISTER WAS SAYING. NO. MY HEART WAS BACK WITH JACK TO WAR-TIME DAYS OF 1939 / 45 WHEN WE RODE THE NEAR DESERTED ROADS OF ENGLAND TOGETHER. SO LONG AGO.....
